

Student Checklist for a Quality Post

✓ **Title: Make it Clear and Descriptive**

Use a title that reflects the content of your post.

Example: "How Different Types of Water Affect Plant Growth: My Science Fair Project and Reflection."

✓ **Competency/Skill: Select the Appropriate Portfolio Section**

Categorize the post to the competency/skill it is demonstrating.

Example: Innovator.

✓ **Use Evidence: Show, Don't Just Tell**

Attach photos, videos, audio recordings, or documents from your computer/One Drive/Google Drive, or URL. Make sure that they demonstrate the competency/skill you selected.

Example: A series of photos of your plants at different stages of growth, including a short video explaining your experiment setup.

✓ **Reflect: Show What You Learned and Link it to the Portrait of a Graduate Attributes**

Share the story behind your work or experiences – what you did, what you learned, the challenges you faced, and the solutions you found. Connect this experience to your development in your Portrait of a Graduate journey.

Example: "For my science fair project, I tested how plants grew when I watered them with tap water, filtered water, and saltwater. I found that tap water and filtered water helped the plants grow better, but saltwater made them stop growing. It was hard to keep everything the same for all the plants, but I fixed this by keeping track of how much sunlight and water each plant got every day.



✓ **Proofread and Polish**

Before publishing, always double-check your post for grammar, spelling, tone, and clarity.

Tip: A polished post written from your unique perspective will feel more authentic and meaningful.




